Emerald Ash Borer (EAB)

Host: All species of ash trees

Look for:

Ash Canopy Dieback



Woodpecker Peeled Bark



S-shaped Tunnels Under Bark

Asian Longhorned Beetle (ALB)

Host: Maples and other hardwoods

Look for:

Small Pits in Bark



Exit Hole at Least 1" Deep



Sawdust at Branch and Tree Base

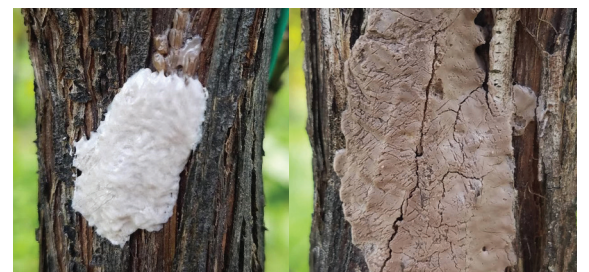

Spotted Lanternfly (SLF)

Host: Tree of heaven, black walnut, willow, birch, sumac, maple

Look for:

Egg Masses (September – June)



Early Nymph .25-.5" (May – July)



Late Nymph .5" (July – September)
